

KEITH McBURNETT is a Professor in Psychiatry at the University of California, San Francisco. He trained in child clinical psychology at The University of Georgia and in rehabilitation psychology (neuropsychology) at New York University Medical Center, graduating in 1989. He held a faculty appointment in Pediatrics at University of California at Irvine from 1990 to 1997. From 1997 through 2001, he held a faculty appointment in Child Psychiatry at the University of Chicago. In 2001 he joined the faculty in Psychiatry at UCSF. Dr. McBurnett maintains an active clinical research program (multiple grants and clinical pharmacology trials, over 100 scientific publications) focusing on diagnostic categorization, treatment outcome, and biological factors (endocrine, neurocognitive) in child externalizing psychopathology. From 2003 through 2006, he served as Associate Editor of the Journal of Abnormal Child Psychology. He and Linda Pfiffner edited a text, Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder: Concepts, Controversies, New Directions, which was published in 2008. Dr. McBurnett's most recent NIH grant investigates the relations among ADHD symptoms and Sluggish Cognitive Tempo (SCT). His research areas of greatest impact have been in the relationship between cortisol and aggression, latent structure and validity of SCT, and efficacy of treatments for ADHD.
